I. In Defence Of Wind Turbines

The coverage of the Open Championship on the BBC showed again why our national broadcaster is so admired around the world. East Kent received some valuable publicity with Chamber members Prince's Golf Club and Royal Cinque Ports Golf Club frequently mentioned in warm tones. Star commentator Peter Alliss even had time to praise Visit Kent for looking after his American friends so splendidly. No surprise there. Of course, there was the occasional cause for concern. We can hardly blame the BBC for the atrocious wind and rain earlier today, but it may wish to look again at the performance of Australian commentator Wayne Grady who betrayed a surprising ignorance and an unwarranted personal opinion about our part of the world. At around 4.45 pm on the opening day, the cameras strayed onto the picturesque turbines of Thanet Offshore Windfarm, a tourist attraction in itself that is the visible manifestation of an investment of £800 million in our energy generation infrastructure by the Swedish company Vattenfall. Commentator Wayne Grady, no matinee idol himself, said: "They're ugly. They do their job then so be it". It is a pity he doesn't do his job a little better. We can perhaps forgive him his lack of aesthetic appreciation, but not his comment a few moments later when the player Kyle Stanley came into view: "Now, 23 year-old, young fellow, I don't, well, don't know anything about him, Jim". Fortunately, the much better informed Jim Nantz proved to have studied his brief of the golfers Grady had been employed to describe and managed to rescue the position. In his autobiography "My Life", the wonderfully avuncular Peter Allis describes how he fought to keep the late Alex Hay on the roster of commentators. Allis writes that Alex Hay was dropped in 2004 on the misinformed notion that "he was out of date, not keeping up with modern methods". Peter Allis very much missed the professionalism and expert analysis from Hay who sadly passed away on IIth of this month. It is a shame that Grady, Hay's successor in many respects, is not a little more in touch with modern technology. This Chamber would be pleased to arrange for his enlightenment with a visit to the turbines of the world's largest offshore windfarm that Grady so dislikes. We could also introduce him to Chamber member the London Array, which is building an even bigger windfarm off the East Kent coast. After all, there may be a benefit in knowing something about your subject before you pass judgement.

3. More About Public Money

We are grateful again to Graham Razey, the pioneering Principal of Thanet College who has just sent the Chamber details of the sum the college has switched to local suppliers. Readers of Thanet & East Kent Insider of 2nd July 2011 will recall that at a

Chamber business networking breakfast earlier that week, we received news of the total spend. We know that Chamber members will be pleased to have some more background on the budget changes. At the end of Quarter 2 in January 2011, the percentage of non-pay related services procured from local suppliers had risen from 34% to 38%. The Quarter 3 results showed a further increase to 40% giving a total boost to the local economy in the period from 31 July 2010 to 30 April 2011 of £703,000. Three areas that have benefited particularly well are Marketing up from 61% to 76%, Professional Fees which show an increase from 19% to 52% and Equipment & Consumables which has risen from 15% to 21%. Many public bodies talk about a "Buy Local" scheme, but few are able to prove to local businesses that they do what they say. 4. Oyster

The official launch of the UK's first oyster flavour crisps is scheduled for the Whitstable Oyster Festival which takes place from 23rd to 30th July 2011. We have commented previously on this enterprising hand-cooked crisps initiative from Quex Foods which puts East Kent produce firmly in the spotlight. Managing Director Anthony Curwen has steered this Chamber member in new directions, revitalising Quex Estates and providing a template on how to develop fresh ideas in new markets in a rural economy. The success of the trial tastings was not a surprise to the many locals who have been tempted at various locations in the last three months, or as Anthony puts it: ""The Oyster and Vinegar bags have already received an amazing response from those who have tried them." If you would like to hear the full story of Kent Crisps, you might like to attend the talk Anthony will be giving at Whitstable Oyster Festival at midday on Sunday, July 24th July 2011. He will also surely recount how Quex Estates has managed to add value to the harvest from its extensive agricultural holdings with other innovative products such as Extra Virgin Rapeseed Oil and Extra Virgin Sunflower Oil. The Engager works with people to find a competitive advantage. The Sponge looks for knowledge and is always learning. Anyone who has all the ten qualities listed in full measure can safely ignore the Think Big programme.
