I. Weight on Your Shoulders

The British Chambers of Commerce has just published its 2009 Burdens Barometer. It shows that the cumulative cost to business of new regulation since 1998 has risen to £76.81 billion, a rise of over £10 billion from last year. There is evidence of a dawning realization that loading cost after cost on British companies is damaging our competitive position as there are now 18 new laws which produce a net cost saving of £1.4 billion. The overall cost remains shockingly high and increasing which must constitute a significant cause of business failure. The two costliest burdens are the Working Time Regulations 1999 which has cost business £17.8 bn to date with a recurring annual charge of £1.8 bn The Vehicle Excise Duty (Reduced Pollution) (Amendment) Regulations 2000 (EU Pollution Directive 98/69/EC) is next in line as to date it has cost British business £10.4 bn with a recurring price of £1.2 bn. The visit this week of President Barack Obama of the USA leads us to reflect on the words of one previous US President, Calvin Coolidge. When asked how he was going to manage to take a Summer holiday and still be free to authorize new legislation, he replied famously, "We have enough laws already, I don't need to sign any more". 4. Winning Mentality

On Friday of last Week, Kent Cricket Club hosted a lunch to celebrate the Playing for Success initiative which has inspired school children to adapt a healthier life style. There are four participating centres; Margate Football Club, Kent Spitfires Study Centre at Canterbury, the Fleet Learning Zone at Ebbsfleet United football ground and Buckmore Park Kart Circuit where Lewis Hamilton learned his trade. Sponsored by Kent County Council, the Playing for Success programme has acquired an enviable reputation for enthusing hitherto recalcitrant learners with a fun packed programme that combines literacy, numeracy and computer classes with opportunities to meet sporting stars on their home patch. Speaking at the lunch were Kent cricketers Geraint Jones and James Tredwell, who both admitted to being totally convinced by the project. Adding his voice to the support was Kent-born athlete, Ian Wynne, an Olympic medalist in the 2004 Athens games who gave a graphic account of how he had spent 16 years in training to prepare for an Olympic 500m Kayak final race lasting I minute 38 seconds. Claiming the rapt attention of the assembled audience of mostly overweight business executives, lan explained how the night before his Olympic final he had helped a female pentathlete unload her equipment from the Olympic village bus and in doing so had slipped and severely damaged his ankle. From being the favourite for the gold medal, he suddenly became a likely candidate for a swift return home and a lifetime of acute disappointment. Anyone who remembers the final will recall that Ian did make it to the start line with a heavily-strapped ankle and powered his way to the finish to snatch the bronze medal position in the final few strokes. After retiring from Olympic competition, Ian continued his ferocious paddling to set a world record in 2007 for crossing the Channel in a canoe. His time of 2 hours 59 minutes from Dover to Calais stunned the boat world and caused a few ferry captains to review their propulsion systems. Integrating sports stars into the curriculum to inspire children with the will to succeed will bring enormous benefits to our community and shows again where Kent County Council has got it right. 7. Stress and ACE

The Academy for Chief Executives met earlier this week in the business suite at the Express by Holiday Inn at Minster for the second session of the East Kent chapter. Guest speaker for the morning was Sue Firth, the celebrated TV business psychologist who specializes in advising senior executives on how to handle stress. She outlined the chemical effects of sudden exposure to stress and why our bodies produce adrenaline, cortisol and serotonin. Sue explained how 18 months ago it was discovered that the heart reacts to the onset of danger before the brain. The human body requires a primitive binary distinction between choosing "flight or fight". Giving the example of the frozen face of George Bush when he was first informed of the attack on the New York World Trade Centre, Sue recommended coping in such extreme situations by taking 6 deep breaths per minute with a pause before each intake. Thanks to a willing volunteer and the assistance of a linked computer, she demonstrated the remarkable effect on the heartbeat of this simple technique. As the recession is in full swing, correct decision-making under stressful conditions is at a premium. With further examples, Sue showed how business performance can be improved if senior managers manage their stress levels through a balanced diet of rest and relaxation in which good humour, music, sport and other physical activities can play a key part. 9. Cricket, Names and How to Acquire Instant Prestige

Martin Saggers is scheduled to enjoy a benefit season at Kent County Cricket club. Saggers is a bowler who has matured wonderfully well in Kent. Why is his progress special? He has clearly benefited from having a ready-made nickname. Anyone familiar with the traditions of cricket will know that it is almost a statutory obligation for well-known players and associates to have a nickname; preferably one that ends in "ers". Thus the doyen of cricket commentators, Brian Johnston, was endlessly referenced as "Johnners". Mike Atherton, a former England cricket captain, presented a clear case for being "Athers" and as such he is universally celebrated or affectionately pilloried, depending on whether you come from Middlesex or Australia. As with most cultural norms, there are exceptions. The extraordinary facial growth on the visage of the late BBC scorer, Bill Frindall, determined that he should be known around the world as "The Bearded Wonder" rather than "Frinders" which is also too close in sound to a well-known brand of fish fingers. Some might argue that Saggers had an unfair advantage in life, but, as a true entrepreneur, he has profited from it. After working his way through the ranks at Derbyshire, Essex, Leicestershire, Norfolk and Durham, Saggers joined Kent in 1998. He has enjoyed a successful career culminating in caps for England in 2003 and 2004. This Chamber considers that any aspiring cricketers might like to take note of the importance of having a name ending in "ers". A young bowler with the legal name 'John Robertson' could consider a change to "Robbers", although this could attract undue attention in matches against the Metropolitan Police.
