3. That Lot In Europe

On 30 April 2008, the interbank exchange rate produced 1.2698 Euros for one British pound. One year later, one pound buys 1.1139 Euros. Ignoring other factors for the moment, the net effect of this swing is that anything sourced from Kent that you wish to sell in the Eurozone is now 14% cheaper than a year ago. Conversely, that cheap bottle of wine in the Calais supermarket that you bought at Easter last year is now 14% more expensive. The good news for local companies is that your margin on sales to France has increased considerably. It may not have been worthwhile to sell your wares in Nord Pas De Calais 12 months ago. It might be now. Similarly, your prices for French, Belgium and Dutch visitors to your shop in East Kent are now 14% more attractive and it might now be in your interests to make your products or services known to our cousins on the other side of the Channel. With this in mind, this Chamber will be visiting officials in Calais in a few weeks to arrange a group visit later in the year when East Kent companies will have the opportunity to meet potential French clients in convivial surroundings and a pleasant atmosphere designed to encourage cross-channel trading. 7. Formula I and Leadership

These columns have featured various comments on leadership from the hardline dictatorial approach of Brian Clough to the consensual sociability favoured by many recent MBA graduates. Two aspects have characterised all the managers depicted; they are inspirational and they are successful. It is interesting to note that after Jenson Button crossed the line ahead of his rivals at the Bahrain Grand Prix last Sunday, he was quick to praise his line manager, Ross Brawn. Jensen said tellingly; "He is a proper leader and he's turned the team into a tight unit, which is what you need in Formula One". It is not just in motor racing that proper leadership is required, but in all aspects of management if local companies are to survive and flourish in the current trying economic conditions. Of course, if you are heading for a hairpin bend at 180 mph it is comforting to have confidence in the man responsible for your braking system. It is also reassuring to know that the brake pads are not over-engineered making your car too heavy and therefore uncompetitive. That great innovator, Colin Chapman, the founder of Lotus, summed up the dilemma facing a Formula 1 team boss when he said: "Any car which holds together for more than one race is too heavy." Or to put it another way, "If your suspension arm breaks, you have made it too thin. If it does not break, you have made it too thick." Colin Chapman's doctrine of "adding lightness" made him a brilliant race engineer, but what brought him seven Formula One Constructors' titles, six Drivers' Championships, and the Indianapolis 500 crown were his drivers. He inspired them to drive. They drove for him and they were successful. Colin Chapman was a proper leader. So is Ross Brawn. We can learn much from them.

8. Thin & Hollow Stories

Rob Thrower, Director of Relocation at Thanet College, is entitled to a few moments of respite following his successful negotiations with government to keep the new Thanet College project on schedule and on budget. However, in an out-of-hours conversation with the Chamber, he highlighted the issue of different approaches to quality control. Rob recalled the story of a Japanese motor manufacturer asked to supply a European company with 1,000 gearbox components. The purchase order stipulated a permissible faulty parts quota of 0.3%. The 1,000 parts were duly delivered from Tokyo alonside a separate parcel containing 3 additional parts accompanied by a note along the lines of: "We are not quite sure why you wanted 3 faulty components but we have modified the enclosed parts accordingly and ask you to accept the extra ones with our compliments." Thanks for this, Rob. More of the same, very welcome. The Japanese are not the only ones to pride themselves on their quality control and engineering prowess. A story doing the rounds in Zurich in the 1970s concerned the visit of an Osaka watchmaker to La Chaux-de-Fonds. Before leaving, he presented his Swiss hosts with a small glass-fronted presentation case labelled, "The thinnest wire in the world". On a reciprocal visit two months later, the Swiss watchmakers returned the case with a new label, "The thinnest tube in the world". Now that's class.
