I. Swine Flu

We are grateful to our partners at the Channel Chamber of Commerce for drawing our attention to the official advice on Swine Flu. The World Health Organisation has increased the pandemic alert for Swine Flu to level 5. This is not a declaration of a pandemic but is indicative of a higher level of risk of a widespread outbreak. The message from government is along the lines of "hope for the best but be prepared for the worst". Employers will find a useful guide at

www.cabinetoffice.gov.uk/media/132829/intro_staffadvice_flu_planning.pdf which also recommends a sample text to issue to employees. Companies with the best interests of their staff at heart will take note of the advice to consider changes in working practices and to ensure that all members of the workforce are aware of sickness absence policies. The NHS has also produced a comprehensive 23-page guide which lists some practical measures that businesses can introduce to reduce the risk of infection and restrict the spread of the flu virus. 3. More About The French

Thanet & East Kent Chamber has been invited to the Calais Chamber of Commerce next week to arrange a meeting in September in Calais when East Kent businesses can meet their French counterparts and enjoy the opportunity for serious cross-channel trading. As well as profiting from our excellent relations with the Dover District Chamber of Commerce and the Channel Chamber of Commerce, we will be advised by Valerie Pondaven of the Enterprise Europe Network. Valerie has had considerable success in helping Kent companies open new markets in France. The exchange rates differential between the pound sterling and Euro, see last week's edition for a detailed explanation, has encouraged Kent firms to take advantage of their competitive prices and find new markets among our nearest European neighbours. To avoid misunderstandings in communication with French people, Valerie sensibly advises English-speakers to avoid double negatives such as "It is not impossible" and to restrict expressions such as "It went pear-shaped". Food manufacturers might also be wise to check on the correct translation of the word "preservative" as the average French person would be very concerned at finding a "preservatif" in the marmalade at breakfast. The word has an entirely different meaning in French which is not usually associated with marmalade, although we all have different tastes.

Following the success of the Thanet Chamber IT Forum and the Thanet Chamber Grants Workshop, the Dover District Chamber of Commerce is organizing similar events at their premises at Whitfield, not far from the Ramada Hotel on the A2 on the approach to Dover. 8. Famous Last Words

The demise of some well-known high street chains in recent months prompts the thought of whether their owners provided posterity with some appropriate last words. For instance, did the UK Managing Director of Woolworths announce the closure of the last shop with the statement, "No more Pick & Mix". Closer to home, when Vantis Business Recovery Services were appointed administrators of Active Signs on 26th February this year, did the incoming specialist allow the final manufacture of a large Exit sign. Companies heading towards administration are perhaps unwilling to reveal their illness; after the malady has taken its course, they may be too distressed to comment. On the other hand, monuments to deceased people offer the chance to record memorable words. With few exceptions, the opportunities are usually lost. Highgate Cemetery in London is the resting place of many notables. Sadly, the gravestone of the founder of P&O does not list "On a farewell voyage", nor does the tombstone of Charles Fortnum of the Fortnum & Mason clan state "Filling his last hamper". All is not lost however as two of the UK's finest showbusiness figures extended their entertainment beyond the funeral service. Oscar Wilde is reported to have murmured from his death bed in Paris, "Either that wallpaper goes or I do". He did - on 30 November 1900. But perhaps we should end this passage with homage to the Diocese of Chichester which, after much debate, allowed the following Gaelic inscription on Spike Milligan's headstone: "Duirt me leat go raibh me breoite", which means in plain English and much to the satisfaction of the Goon Show Preservation Society, "I told you I was ill".
